

Summer Trail in Davenport.

It was a beautiful June morning in Davenport, Florida some year in the mid-1960's. My sister Gloria and I dressed, did our chores, ate breakfast and headed out for a fun day. As we walked to the school for Summer Recreation, we sang the Seven Dwarf's song about going to work but with our own twist, "Hi-ho, hi-ho, it's off to school we go."

Along the way, we passed Alma Linder's store. Alma carried just about everything any person needed in the 1960's. We waited in line as some other kids bought their bags of candy. Once we arrived at the school, Gloria usually chose to make lanyards (you know, those braided necklaces with clips at the bottom to attach things). I always pulled my

nickel or dime out of my pocket to buy a plaster-of -Paris wall plaque to paint. I loved to paint. We saw our schoolmates and enjoyed some casual time with them.

At 12:00 we heard the fire siren at the City Hall. Don't worry, that sound has been going off since the dinosaurs roamed the earth or since the town decided to notify workers when it was noon. Marguerite Williams, our City Clerk since 1934, always checked the National Weather Service for the correct time before she blew the siren.

Noontime meant lunch. We stopped by dad's Watch Shop (Torgersen's Watch Repair Shop) to be nice and see if he wanted us to go get him some lunch. He saw right through our scheme. We all enjoyed the hamburgers and cherry cokes.

Two o'clock rolled around and that meant the pool was open. Yahoo! Let's go swimming! Everyone was at the pool! It was first filled with water in 1953, by the Davenport Chamber of Commerce, compliments of the President, Mr. Oswald Wiley. I remember Mrs. Lillian Judy, wife of Bethel Judy (Police Chief), always being there to keep the concession stand open. I heard that H.L.H. was a respected swim coach. If you have never heard of him, he was also know as Hairy Legs Hazlett or Harry Lynn Hazlett. Continued page 3.
